INTESA SANPAOLO: 2 NEW COVID-19 EMERGENCY CENTERS CREATED AND 16 ITALIAN HOSPITALS SUPPORTED IN EIGHT REGIONS WITH A DONATION OF 100 MILLION EURO

The results:

- 36 wards and diagnostic laboratories created or repurposed
- 500 additional Covid-19 beds
- over 1,900 pieces of medical and diagnostic equipment purchased
- over 21 million face masks and PPEs purchased to protect doctors and healthcare workers
- 2.6 million test kits, 4 CT scanners, 5 ultrasound machines
- 2.3 million euro raised from 14 thousand donors on the Group's Forfunding.it platform

Milan/Turin, 9 June 2020 - Just two months after signing the Cooperation Protocol with the Extraordinary Commissioner and the Department of Civil Protection, Intesa Sanpaolo has allocated the entire 100 million euro donation to the Italian health service to help tackle the Coronavirus emergency. From the onset of the crisis, Intesa Sanpaolo has joined the country's efforts to tackle and overcome the emergency, providing direct support in order to make a significant and structural contribution to strengthening the National Health Service.

Carlo Messina, CEO of Intesa Sanpaolo, stated: "The COVID-19 pandemic has clearly highlighted the role that private institutions can play in contributing to the common good through support to the public sector. Intesa Sanpaolo's contribution during the health emergency phase, with measures that are also beneficial for the future, is cause for pride and satisfaction. Our commitment rests on the Bank's performance and its solidity, benefitting the entire community. In this new phase - in which the emergency is above all social and economic - we will continue to support Italy's revitalization with significant new measures"

2 new Covid Emergency Centers and 16 hospitals in eight Italian regions have benefitted from the donation, one of the largest made in Europe. In detail, the donation has funded the creation of as many as 36 healthcare facilities, including newly created wards, wards repurposed as Covid-19 treatment centers and specialist diagnostic laboratories, and has increased the bed capacity by a further 500 beds, mainly in sub-intensive and intensive care units. In addition, so far the initiative has supplied over 1,900 pieces of essential patient care medical and diagnostic equipment: ventilators, CPAP helmets, respirators, infusion pumps, cold nebulizer systems, monitors and high flow humidifiers, CT scanners, ultrasound machines and reagents to make test kits. To protect doctors and healthcare workers, Intesa Sanpaolo has also allocated part of the donation to the purchase of over 21 million PPEs such as face masks, gloves, coveralls and gowns.

The crowdfunding campaign linked to the donation on Intesa Sanpaolo's www.forfunding.it platform has so far raised 2.3 million euro from 14 thousand donors. The campaign ends on 31 August 2020.
